Communication between humans began thousands of years ago with the use of smoke signals, symbols, pictures, and sounds. Telephone communication, however, is dated just over 150 years ago.

Explore how the telephone has changed over time. Represent this evolution in a [timeline](#).

Better yet! Challenge yourself to add a marble run to your timeline! It should show what happened when and how much time went by between events as the marble passes.

Learning Activities

You & Your World:

Have you ever wondered what makes things tick? Or ring?

Get a hold of an old phone (the older the better!) and have an adult help you open it up to see what's inside.

In your journal, draw what you see, guess what you think things inside are for and write down any questions you have. Is there anything inside that is useful or could be made into something else?

* If you cannot get a hold of an old phone, draw your best guess as to what's inside, then check your drawing with one from the internet!



Numeracy/Art:

Telephones turn sounds into electrical signals, which are then carried through wires to another phone. The electrical signals are turned back into sound waves so someone can hear.



Create your own "funky telephones" to explore how sound travels from person to person. Measure the length, using non-standard measurement, of the string between your friends.

What you need:

- two small plastic containers
- scissors
- glue
- thick string/wool
- colored felt,
- feathers, beads, sequins, etc.



Literacy:

With your teacher, brainstorm different types of technology that are used in your home or school that help you communicate and play together. Make a chart that shows the different types of technology. Can you think of and describe ways you would communicate without these technologies?

Physical Wellness

Create your own at-home walking trail inside your house or out. Create 5 different stops along your trail where you will perform and hold a pose for 20 seconds before moving on to the next stop. Start your walk by stopping as *the tree*. Next move on to *the nest* and then head to the *Mountain*. Finally, you will cross the *bridge* and finish your walk by visiting the *handwashing station* where you will wash your hands for 20 seconds.

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Math:

After building your marble run, estimate in centimeters or meters the length your marble run measures. It may get tricky to measure if there are twists and turns but get creative on using different measuring tools!



Science (STSE):

What devices have been used to communicate in the last 200 years? What materials were they made from?


Learning Activities

"The same brain circuits that are activated by eating chocolate and winning money are activated when teenagers see large numbers of 'Likes' on their own photos..."




Using this information, and other resources, create a piece of writing that attempts to persuade the reader in one of two ways:
